CELEBRATING AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION: On February 25, 2008, fifty plus individuals gathered at the Marion Township Library. They heard presentations about how an FFA/Ag Ed program could be reestablished at Marion Local. A resulting core group actively pursued the initiative and Ag Ed returned to ML in the fall of 2010. The program continues to be robust, providing state of the art education and training to our students. The Ag students have prepared a brochure highlighting the benefits of the program. To support these students and the program, the MCDO is featuring their brochure in our summer newsletter. Please review it and learn about this very positive development in our community.

OTHER NEWS: The continued building in the Industrial Park is most gratifying. We will be featuring the companies responsible in future correspondence and on our website. Lots for residential housing are available and we continue to have a steady stream of new homes being built. A front page story in the May 31^{st} edition of the Daily Standard noted that Mercer County will continue to grow through 2030 in the key 20 - 39 age group. We're delighted that so many young couples want to return to Flyer Country and we're optimistic that the Marion Community will contribute its share to our county's growth.

Chickasaw continues to make progress toward its new water system. The MCDO Chapel Hill preschool is full for the fall term. Our school board and administration continues to pursue facilities enhancements. There is a high likelihood that the Tri Star Career Compact will be able to consolidate in a new facility close to the Wright State Branch Campus (See Mike Pohlman's update). Tri Star provides an effective alternative for students who learn better with "hands on" education. All these developments we've mentioned make our area a great place to live. They draw business and industry and we the MCDO strongly support all of them.

Marion Local Schools—Mike Pohlman

It was an enjoyable 2015-2016 school year, as our district was blessed again with numerous accomplishments. I would like to congratulate all of them for their successes throughout the year. Congratulations to all of our 62 graduates who participated in commencement ceremonies on May 22nd.

At the June 13th Board meeting, the Marion Local Board of Education announced their intention to pursue the options for constructing a new Auditorium, Gymnasium, and Agricultural Education complex. Discussions will continue on choosing an architect and creating a timeline to fund this project. All funding options will be considered including a levy, capital campaigns, grants, and utilizing our capital fund savings account which was just passed at tonight's Board meeting. The practice band field and concession/restroom facility are still being pursued and discussed. All funding options are still being considered for this also.

Recently I have been involved in the formation of a levy in regards to constructing a new facility for Tri Star. I would like to take this opportunity to present our community with some facts and information for you to be an informed voter on August 2nd. Mr. Bob Heitbrink and Mr. Paul Gagel also serve on this committee to help inform our community about Tri Star.

- A positive vote for a 15 year 0.95 mill levy will fund a central Career Technical School that will house all of the Tri Star programs in one location instead of the current six locations. Tri Star will remain a compact and not turn into a joint vocation school. Our students will still take their core classes at Marion Local High School.
- All nine school districts will share in the cost and will have the opportunity to vote on August 2nd. If the majority of all voters select "yes" then the levy passes.
- The new location will be across the road from WSU Lake Campus.
- The levy would cost the owner of a \$100,000 home \$33.25 per year.
- The total project cost will be approx. \$25 million with the state share being approx. \$8 million and the local share being approx. \$17 million.

Even though school is out, it will still be very busy at both schools during the break. I would like to thank the community for their continued support of the Marion Local school district. This year was very successful and it is because of the collaboration we have with you. Mandatory shutdown this year is June 26th to July 10th. I hope you have an enjoyable and safe summer.

Our Lady of the Rock is situated on the front lawn of the Maria Stein Shrine of the Holy Relics. The story of Kloster Mariastein reveals a mother tending animals and falling asleep. Her son wondered off and fell from a cliff towards the valley some 150 feet below. Fearing the worst, the distraught mother climbed down and found the boy picking flowers. He said the flowers were for the beautiful Lady who caught him in her arms. Mother Maria Anna Brunner (foundress of the Sisters of the Precious Blood) made pilgrimages to Kloster Mariastein. Her son, Francis de Sales Brunner, was a Benedictine Monk and Precious Blood Missionary, and his early spiritual experiences and connection to the Kloster Maria Stein led to his naming the convent Maria Stein, in Ohio.

To learn further history of the Shrine and the local settlers, plan to visit the Heritage Museum at the Shrine all of which are open seven days a week. Mon.-Thur.: 9:30-6:00; Fri.-Sat.: 9:30-4:00 and Sun.: noon-4:00. Weekday tours are offer at 10:00am with custom tours and pilgrimages available by calling 419-925-4532.

Here's what's happening at the library. Our summer reading program is in full swing. You can still come in and sign up for the program which this year is titled "On your mark, get set...READ!" We are emphasizing sports and fitness within this program. To complete the program and receive a goody bag your child only needs to check out ten books. We have special programming every Monday at 1:30 and 3 pm where we have some special guests and we do a craft. Check out our Face book page each week or pick up a program in the library for the schedule. We also still have story hour every Thursday morning at 10:30 am. Adults and teens can also join our program just by checking out a book and can enter to win prizes, such as Cleveland Indians tickets, Kings Island tickets, COSI tickets, Maria Stein Dairy Station gift cards and much more. The end of summer reading party will be held on Thursday, July 28th at 1:30 pm at the Knights of St. John Hall in Maria Stein. On Wednesday, August 24th we will be hosting Zachary Hoffman of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) at 6:30 pm in the library basement. Zachary will be presenting the program "How the PUCO works for you". This program provides a broad overview of the PUCO and its services, including information on Ohio's Energy Choice program, assistance programs and how to get help with a utility related dispute or complaint. Participants are invited to bring in their utility bills and a PUCO representative will answer questions and help them navigate the confusion.

Check out our showcase in the library where each month we spotlight a different artist from the Lake Area Arts Group (LAAG). Also on display in our basement is a permanent display of artists' wall hangings.

Also new to the library is a mineral display cabinet with some minerals on loan from the Celina Library's Langsdon Mineral Collection. In 2006 Ron & Ruth Langsdon donated a substantial part of their personal rare mineral collection to the main library in Celina in order for future generations to learn and enjoy. They felt a public library would be an ideal location for all present and future generations. The collection consists of more than 900 minerals from all over the world in 21 display cases. A presentation about the minerals will be held at the Marion Twp. Branch Library in Chickasaw on Tuesday, August 9th at 6:30 pm. Participants will be given a mineral kit with minerals in sand and a gold miner's pan. Participants search for each mineral by color, shape, and texture. They also learn the history of the mineral, the mineral's use in industry, the mineral's crystal make up, and the mineral's origin. Children from age 8 and up and adults are invited to attend.
