Our Marion Local Ag Education program continues to thrive. The FFA students held their annual banquet on Monday March 14. They conduct all the proceedings in a most professional manner. I am always impressed.

Marion Local Schools—Mike Pohlman We are entering the final nine weeks of the school year and students are eager to head down the homestretch as we continue to provide them with valuable educational experiences. We recently received our district report card from the state of Ohio. I would like to explain why we received an achievement grade of a "D" and also a "B". This grade is derived from how well our students score on state assessments. This past year we had many students opt out from taking assessments and the state counted that as a score of zero. As you are well aware a score of zero can bring a districts achievement score down, but after legislators met with the Ohio Department of Education it was decided to report a modified achievement score that didn't count students who opted out. I appreciate the efforts from legislators and would like to recognize Representative Jim Buchy for his support in communicating Marion Local's performance index score which more truly reflects how we are achieving as a district. Administrators in Mercer County decided to develop our own "Quality Profile" that is a more user friendly report of how our schools are performing. I recently joined a group of over 35 local superintendents in our area and we formed a committee called the Northwest/West Central Ohio Public School Advocacy Network. This grew from concerns over a loss of local control in public education. The group believes there are many areas within public education where if local control was restored, it would improve education and benefit schools and students. The group believes that locally-controlled public education with governmental support is valued instead of public education dominated by government regulations. School officials, board members, teachers, students and parents should have majority say about the direction of their own school districts. The first initiative of the network is to survey people about public education. The survey will be active until April 15th and can be found under "recent announcements" at www.marionlocal.org or you can go directly to https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/8F5K2W8. The survey should only take 5 minutes and please feel free to share this with other Marion Local community members.



We will continue to search for funds to replace the Ash trees in the park at an estimate of approximately \$8,000. Anyone willing to donate to this, please contact us.


We also have an Eagle Scout project by Tim Knapschafer in process to raise and complete electrical for the scoreboard purchased from the school. It will be for use on the Pony League diamond. Costs of approximately \$4500 will be incurred by the Park Board with donated labor.

The Shrine's chapel in the park was in need of structural work and siding repair. Labor was donated to and is in process of being completed by the Shrine of which we supported material costs of approximately \$500 as it is located in the park.

Looking ahead...We have had discussions and considered community suggestions for future ideas for the park. Many factors go into major projects as well as funding that must be raised. Applications for grant money are considered and come with a substantial local responsibility (40-50%). Because we are not a part of a municipality, all of this is raised through fundraising efforts/donations in addition to maintaining what we currently have. We continue to consider options for future projects that may be feasible.
