INDUSTRIAL PARK – Companies continue to establish and expand in our industrial park. Buildings for Chickasaw veterinarian Bill Minton, M S Welding, and Buschur Leasing are in various stages of completion. This construction has pretty much filled up the latest expansion to our park. Moeller Brew Barn has started on a significant expansion in the original industrial park. These commercial properties pay a higher tax rate than private residences or farm acreage and buildings. Initially, these taxes are diverted to pay for the construction of the required infrastructure; land preparation, streets and storm and sanitary sewer lines. Long term these taxes will be a boon to our township government, our schools and the Chickasaw Fire department. We sincerely thank the many companies and individuals who have located there. We appreciate your belief in the viability of the Marion Community.

HOUSING – Young families continue to build here in the Marion Community. This too is an incredibly positive development. We welcome all of them with open arms! Lots continue to be available at various locations. These locations and contact information are noted in our monthly MCDO minutes. RCS is expanding Washington Street north which will open more lots in Marion Acres.

SR 716 EAST SIDE SIDEWALK – As noted homes are being built by young families in Marion Acres and Woodview Estates. We continue to consider options on how to get children and even older residents safely from these areas to the school property and the rest of the village. This project has a ton of challenges. The good news is that some young parents, full of energy and creative ideas have volunteered to assist with the project. Their enthusiasm is enabling us to move forward positively. We sincerely appreciate their contributions.

INFRASTRUCTURE - Nick Moeller has agreed to be our "Infrastructure" chairperson. He is focusing on two very worthwhile projects. The first is a project to connect the various Marion sub-communities together with a bike path. If you want to know more about the bike path or have questions or concerns, please attend one of their meetings. They are held on the fourth Tuesday of every month at the Moeller Brew Barn starting at 8pm. All are welcome. Nick is also working to bring natural gas into Maria Stein, Chickasaw and Osgood. He and Shannon Everman will be contacting local businesses to ascertain their annual BTU usage. Bringing gas here is expensive but like everything in the business world, proving that a company can earn a decent return on its investment will convince them to provide us service. It is up to us to provide that proof. We wish Nick all the best with both of these projects.

It was an outstanding 2017-2018 school year, as our district was blessed again with numerous accomplishments by both our staff and students. I would like to congratulate all of them for their successes throughout the year. Congratulations to all of our 66 graduates who participated in commencement ceremonies on May 20th. Morgan Heckman was named valedictorian and Seth Pierron was named salutatorian. Of the 66 graduates seventeen received Honors Diplomas, fifteen received the President's Award for Academic Excellence, ten scored a composite score of 27 or higher on the ACT, and they earned \$630,000 in scholarship money with \$71,000 being local. We are very proud of our graduates and their accomplishments and thank all of the donors that sponsored scholarships to help these individuals further their education.

I would like to extend my appreciation to the many individuals that attended the community meeting in late April. We received very good questions and I hope everyone in attendance left with a better understanding. We are still targeting to be on the ballot in November of 2018.

Even though school is out, it will still be very busy at both schools during the break. I would like to thank the community for their continued support of the Marion Local school district. This year was very successful and it is because of the collaboration we have with you. Mandatory shutdown this year is June 24th to July 8th. I hope you have an enjoyable and safe summer.

The Maria Stein Shrine is pleased to announce that a newly renovated space on the 3rd floor of the Shrine, lovingly called "The Upper Room", will be open for special events in July. The room will be available to rent for anniversary parties, birthdays, bridal/baby showers, corporate/religious retreats, holiday parties, reunions, board meetings, rehearsal dinners and other types of events.

"With the increasing numbers attending the Shrine's programs, a larger space was needed for events. The Park Board of Marion Township Park meets monthly. We continue to focus on improving and maintaining the park for our community.

At the time of this writing, the park board is gearing up for the MS Countryfest. We thank you all for continuing to support the park by your patronage at the Taco Boat/Waffle Stand. The benefits to the park continue with a scoreboard being added to the softball diamond #2 as well as future improvements. The park board is currently reviewing options for a future Eagle Scout project as well depending on approval for the scout through the Boy Scouts.

Over the past couple years, we have completed a great deal of projects such as: scoreboards on diamonds 2 (in process) & 3, front side

These are in the very early stages of discussion and truly dependent on a multitude of factors within our Marion Local Community which include a great deal of funds. We would like to hear your opinion or thoughts about which option may be more beneficial as a long-term project to work toward.

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Spiritual Center of Maria Stein—Robin Goettemoeller

Did you know that in 1998 the Spiritual Center Retreat House was sold by the Sisters of the Precious Blood and became it's own non-profit business in Maria Stein? The Retreat House sits on 87 acres next to the Shrine of the Holy Relics. The Retreat House has its

own staff of 42 people, 9 board members, a coordinator, and donors and is not affiliated with the Shrine, just neighborly. Sometimes when you drive by and glance back at the Retreat House and parking lot, it appears that no one is there, so it's easy to assume the Retreat House is never busy. However, on average, over 10,000 people are at the Retreat House each year and over 20,000 meals are regularly served per year. Just the other day, someone walked in for a meeting and she was greeted by 50 high school seniors who were there for a week long Kairos Retreat. She mentioned how surprised she was to see people in the building because there was only one vehicle in the parking lot. While some who are on retreat are from the local



area, most are from Catholic Schools and churches of all denominations that are quite far away (including many international guests who arrive by flights into Dayton and are dropped off). Many of the groups arrive in Maria Stein by caravan or charter bus -which explains the often fairly empty parking lot. Non-Holiday weekends are usually filled to capacity - with an average of 50 people staying overnight each Friday-Sunday and sometimes as many as four different retreats are taking place at the same time throughout the building. While on retreat, people spend time in prayer, they hear presentations, they meet in small groups and discuss topics, they walk the grounds, and focus on their faith, sometimes in complete silence.

Due to the increased amount of retreats taking place in Maria Stein, the decision was made to expand to the newly renovated Montezuma Retreat House (6731 State Route 219, Montezuma). This additional facility will allow us to serve more people, especially youth, which is the main focus of the Montezuma building (although all are welcome!). As the Spiritual Center of Maria Stein and Montezuma continues to grow, we invite the Marion Community to continue to walk the paths and be a part of the prayerful grounds along-side those who are staying for retreats. For those wishing to take pictures (family, wedding, senior, etc) on the property, we love having you here, but we are now asking that you contact the office in advance (419-925-7625 Monday-Friday 8:30-4:00) to be sure there is nothing major going on that will affect your photos.
