During this time the word "fortitude" comes to my mind when I think of the Marion community. Due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) and orders from Governor Mike Dewine, Marion Local has closed for the mandatory three week period which began on Tuesday, March 17th. We can potentially resume back to school on Monday, April 6th if the order has not been extended. Each day we listen to the updates from Governor Dewine and our state and local health department. I can assure you we are doing our best to keep our students and staff safe while not inducing any panic or fear. Things may get worse before they get better, but I can assure you we will recover and bounce back even stronger.

During this 3 week period our teachers will instruct students through distance learning. Our goal is to offer meaningful assignments so our students can still receive a quality education. These assignments will offer more flexibility for our students in regards to the time of day when they are completed. Students in grades 3-12 will be using Google classroom and will be asked to check for instructions from their teachers. Students in grades K-2 will be given "work" books, worksheets, etc... with instructions from their teachers.

OHSAA has also postponed all sporting events and asked each school district to have a "no contact" period with athletes. We were also asked to shut down our athletic facilities. At this time OHSAA is still working on a creative solution without closing the door completely. (This is the status at the time of writing this article.)

I want to publically express my appreciation to the staff at Marion Local. These unprecedented times that are filled with uncertainty, have been handled extremely well. Our students and parents are to be commended also for their willingness to take on this new endeavor of remote learning. This was a very quick turn-around and I thank everyone for embracing it with open arms. We will all learn as we go and I appreciate your understanding. Our custodial, kitchen, and bus driving staff is in the process of disinfecting our school, cafeteria, and buses. We may get a jump start on summer cleaning already this spring.

The Marion community is extremely supportive of our school district. If there is anything you believe the school could assist our community with in these unprecedented and uncertain times, feel free to contact us. I am looking forward to when we will be back in session with all students and staff together again.

Effective Wednesday, March 18th all Mercer Country District Library buildings were closed to the public. Limited staff will be working in the library buildings to answer phone calls and some services are still available to patrons including these FREE resources:

- Curbside pickup at all four library locations during regular library hours.

- Wi-Fi access within approximately 200 feet outside all four library locations.
- Online resources/Apps (mercerlibrary.org/apps) download the following apps from your app store.

 - Manage your account, search the catalog, renew and reserve items to have ready for pickup, and have access to eBooks and audiobooks.



As of this moment, many of our events have been postponed or cancelled. We encourage you to check our website Event Calendar and visit our Facebook page for the most current information. The Shrine, Chapels and Gift Shop will remain open until further notice.

We have pulled the relic of **St. Charles Borromeo for continual veneration.** St. Charles Borromeo (1538-84) was the Cardinal Archbishop of Milan, Italy. He was also a caring pastor who led his congregation courageously and prudently during the epidemic of 1576/77. While the many of Milan's nobility fled the city, St. Charles remained enacting procedures to slow the spread of the disease, establishing makeshift hospitals, and attending to the needs of the poor and sick. He used his personal money to cover the cost of his ministry. The saintly bishop never contracted the illness, attributing that to his fasting of the poor and sick to his fasting and prayer.

We encourage you to visit the Shrine (if you are healthy and able) to help us pray for the intercession of St. Charles and all the Saints during this time of uncertainty.
